LT: I can demonstrate point of view in writing. I can use scenes and appropriate details and description in writing. I can write with voice.

Objective: To take on the perspective of a historical fiction character and be able to connect to and understand their perspective and **point of view**.

Directions: Using all that you have learned over this past unit, you will take on the persona of one of the characters of *Chains* and create a journal/diary entry. Choose between

- Curzon
- Madam Lockton
- Lady Seymour
- Becky
- Master Lockton
- Other, with teacher approval

Requirements:

- 1. You must have one journal entry that is a minimum of one typed page long.
- 2. Size 12 font, easy to read font (i.e. Times) single spaced, double spaced between paragraphs.
- 3. Entry will be written in first person point of view of one of the characters above. Imagine that you are the character at the end of the day in which your chosen scene takes place and write about the event in his/her voice.
- 4. The scene(s) in your journal entry must be from Chains.
- 5. Your journal entry must begin with an epigraph appropriately related to the events and time period.
- 6. You will create a Google Doc and save it as **Chains Final Journal LastName**.
